Student Govt. leadership results in completion of several projects

The Memorial School Student Council has wrapped up a very busy and successful year.

The 2017-2018 Student Council, under advisors Mrs. Glenn and Mrs. Kelly, was President Anthony Vargas, Vice President Kayla Price, Secretary Arianna Aliotta, and Treasurer Amanda Rausch.

This year, the Student Council ran a food drive at Thanksgiving for families in need inWoodland Park. During the month of December, the council collected for St. Jude's Hospital and raised \$3,000. A Spirit Week was organized in the spring which brought students of Memorial together as a community.

During the month of April, the Student Council, under the supervision of Ms. Kate Elman, ran a district-wide drive for Autism Awareness. They raised \$1,584 and spread autism awareness. The month ended with a district-wide autism walk.

In addition, the Student Council members worked with the WP Boys & Girls Club to help obtain funding for and oversee the installation of a new scoreboard in the Memorial School gym.

Finally to end the year, the council organized a river clean up. The students were chosen by teacher recommendation and student interest. The outing was held on June 14.

With the help of the Borough of Woodland Park's Department of Public Works, the Memorial Middle School faculty and administration, the New Jersey Water Environment Association; the students walked from the school to the Passaic River and policed the area and the river bank for litter and debris.

While on the outing the students and guides discussed environmental issues with the water environment and how they can be environmental stewards. Other topics that were discussed were the hydrologic cycle, water sampling and monitoring, local species, pests to be aware of, local plants and their impact on people and the environment. The New Jersey Water Environment Association is a non-profit educational organization dedicated to preserving and enhancing the water environment.

Board given STAR 360 presentation

At the June 18 Board of Education meeting, Director of Curriculum and Instruction Carmella Triglia gave a presentation on STAR 360 test results. This is the third year the district has been utilizing the program.

The presentation aimed to provide an overview of student performance in the areas of math and ELA (English language arts). Triglia noted that STAR 360 test results are just one of many pieces of student performance data collected. In the PowerPoint slides shown at the meeting, overall test scores show slow and steady growth in both math and ELA, according to Superintendent Dr. Michele Pillari.

"People are working really, really hard," she said. "We're making progress. We're working hard and we should all be proud of the results."

In the upcoming school year, the district plans to set targeted goals in the areas of math and ELA in each building. It will work with state representatives to help support teachers in instructional practice and professional learning. Additionally through a state grant, it will work with Rutgers University and state representatives in order to ensure proper implementation of RTI at CO and BG Schools.
