## Many changes are in store for students this year

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Welcome back to another exciting year! I truly hope you were able to take some time to relax and enjoy the lazy days of summer with your family and friends. This time each year, I take a moment to sit back and ask myself, "Where did the summer go?" It seems to slip through my fingers faster and faster every year. At the same time, here in our schools, we have been working tirelessly to ensure that we are ready for the students to return.

First and foremost, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the secretarial staff for working to prepare for September. These individuals are instrumental in ensuring that everything is in order for the first day of school. Their dedication to our school community is beyond compare!

We continue to make great strides in the area of curriculum and program. This summer we worked to refine the ELA rubrics for the K-4 standards-based report cards. These rubrics have been restructured in order to highlight specific and targeted skills per trimester which will provide the parents with more in-depth description of student performance expectations in each area.

I am proud to announce that CO School has been awarded a grant. This grant provides us with an opportunity to work in partnership with Rutgers University and New Jersey Department of Education. This partnership, New Jersey Tiered System of Supports (NJTSS), is an evidence-based framework for implementing academic and behavioral supports and interventions to improve achievement for all students. The work is centered on the core components of the three-tier prevention logic of Response to Intervention (RTI). This is a systematic, consistent approach to prevention, intervention and enrichment for students in need. It provides for a continuum of supports based on student learning of grade level knowledge and skills; Enhances the capacity of the classroom teacher to address learner variability; Supports Professional Learning Communities as a mechanism for problem solving and professional development.

# Library will celebrate the accomplishments of summer readers

The Alfred H. Baumann Public Library will hold its annual End of Summer Party on Saturday, Sept. 8 from 12 to 3 p.m. The party is a celebration of all of the reading that was done over the summer months by those children that participated in the Summer Reading Program at the library. It will be held on the library grounds where there will be games, a bounce house, cotton candy, ice cream and more. Summer reading grand prizes will be awarded. There will be a water balloon toss at 1 p.m. and sack races at 2 p.m.

"This year we saw a record turnout," said Allie Steiger, Youth Services Librarian. "This year the public library partnered with the Woodland Park School District, grades K through 4, resulting in a 34 percent increase in participation."

"We wanted the students to experience reading for pleasure and pure enjoyment over the summer months, that will in turn create life-long readers and library users," stated Linda Hoffman, Library Director. "I hope to see the summer reading partnership with the school expand even further next year."

The library was abuzz with children all summer long, providing programs for children of all ages. One of the highlights was a "Coding Caterpillar" program for incoming Kindergarten students and a "Tinker Kids" S.T.E.M. program for middle school students.

Additionally this summer, the library partnered with the Municipal Alliance Against Alcohol & Substance Abuse and On the Border Restaurant to bring a copy of "The Story of Ferdinand the Bull" to 100 families in the community. Families picked up the copy of the book at the library, were asked to read it together and do accompanying activities and then join the Alliance at the library for an outdoor showing of the movie "Ferdinand." On the Border restaurant supplied chips and salsa and certificates for free meals and appetizers to all that attended the event. Families were able to keep the book for their home library.

We are in our third year of our district wide paperless initiative.
